




Roman locksmiths were as skilled, as respected



- Due to the security related activities of the locksmiths, the Authorities have always kept locksmiths under strict control
- On the other side, locksmiths have always been quite jealous of the their trade and rules and regulations to become a fully recognized master locksmith have always been strictly enforced

- No better proof is available, than the reading of the Statute of the locksmiths and related trade, printed in Rome 1690 AC
- The book belongs to my rich library on locks related books



The Papal Rome was quite attentive to locksmith trade and the Statute mixes

rules pertaining to the trade with

rules pertaining to the behaviour of a devoted Christian

- The most important rule is the affiliation to the Brotherhood of St. Eligius, since 10 centuries patron of locksmiths
- Regular attendance to church services was compulsory



Some technical rules

No one may become master locksmith and open shop, unless trained for 2 years as apprentice and only after successful examination

No one shall open shop unless at least 200 metres away the nearest locksmith shop

No one shall quote for a job, if such a job has been already quoted from a master locksmith

No one shall accept used locks or tools, as such locks may come from a theft

Some religious rules Holy Mass attendance is compulsory

Alimony is compulsory

Dead locksmiths shall be buried in the Brotherhood tomb, still exisisting in Rome main cemetery

A good locksmith shall donate to the church his skill and/or his money

- The St. Eligius church in Rome is, even today, a masterpiece, worth a visit
- only on Sundays, at 11 AM Mass, or during the last week of June, when St. Eligius is celebrated
- The remembrance day of St. Eligius is the 25th of June






The ceiling is a symphony of gold and blue

You will certainly appreciate the vault door, in oak plates, reinforced with iron bands and locked with three keys




 The keys are entrusted to Monsignor Venier, chaplain of the brotherhood, to the Governor in charge and to the Camerlengus – chief finacial officer
